

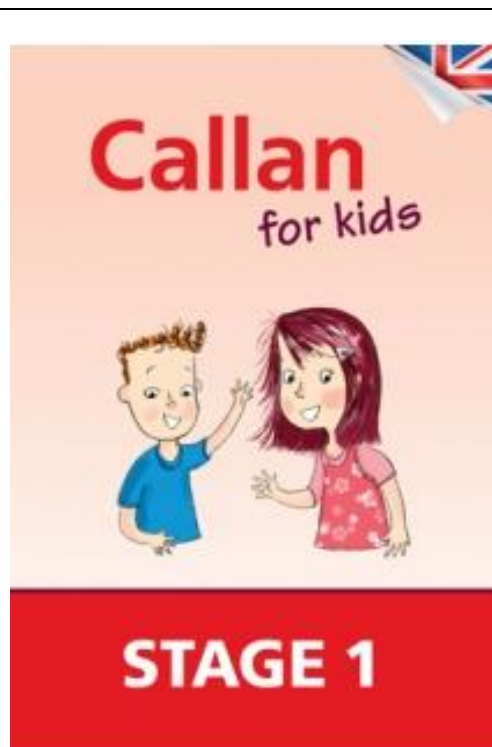

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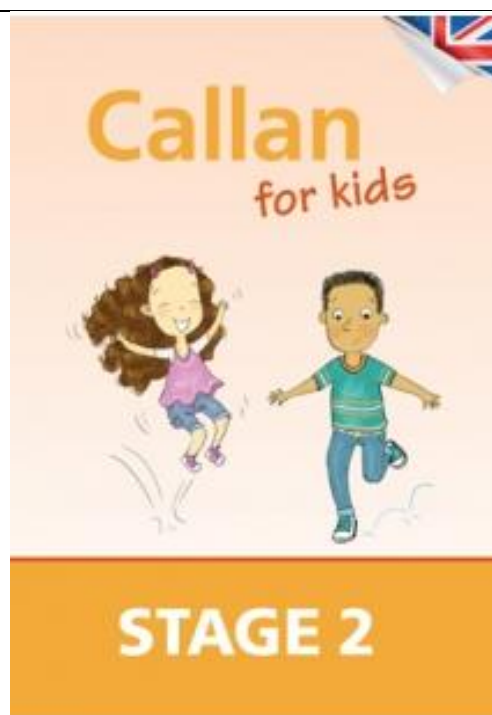


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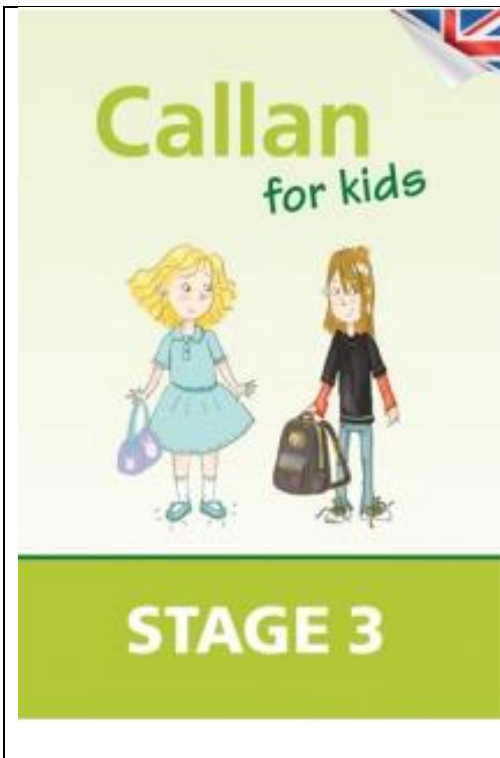
STAGE CONTENT



Stage 1 is for children at the very start of their learning, and it gets them practising some of the most important words and structures in English. Besides acquiring lots of useful vocabulary, children learn to use the verbs "be" and "have", basic numbers, common prepositions, the present continuous (e.g. "you are writing"), personal pronouns, possessive adjectives ("my", "his", "our" etc.) and lots more. Stage 1 contains around 380 headword items.



Targeting children at post-beginner level, **Stage 2** introduces the present simple (e.g. "you write"), comparative language ("more ... than" etc.) and essential modals ("can" and "must"). With around 350 headword items, this stage provides children with a wealth of new vocabulary to help them describe the world around them and express what they are thinking.



Stage 3 builds on the language acquired in the first two stages of Callan for Kids, covering the possessive pronouns, introducing "will" for talking about the future, and dealing further with comparative language (e.g. "the tallest", "as many as"). Practising a wide range of new words and phrases (around 400 headword items), Stage 3 is appropriate for any child starting to prepare for a test at A1 level according to the CEFR.



In addition to offering around 250 valuable new words and phrases, **Stage 4** gets children using both regular and irregular past forms, the "going to" form for the future, and simple relative clauses. On completing Stage 4, children will have covered all language necessary for an A1-level young learners test, and will also have learned a significant amount of A2-level vocabulary.
